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BLATZ (W.E.) COLLECTION

Collection includes: the personal and professional papers of W.E. Blatz, Canadian child psychologist and educator (1919-1966); historical materials relating to the Institute of Child Study and its associated schools (1926-ca. 1970); research material connected with projects carried out at the Institute under the direction of W.E. Blatz, 1926-1964, and after his death, by members of his staff at the Institute and the Brora Centre, up to 1979.

The first and second groups of material are freely available to researchers. The research materials which contain original records, questionnaires, and other data, are presently restricted.

Requests to use the research material may be forwarded to an Advisory Committee on the W.E. Blatz Research Documents which will meet to consider the request. The Director of the Thomas Fisher Rare Book Library is a member of the committee and can forward requests. Prospective users of the data should read the introductory guide to the research documents in Box 49 of the collection (Section II, A)

Original deposit of research material was made by Margery de Roux, daughter and heir of W.E. Blatz, in 1971. Subsequent historical material and more recent research data was assembled by the Brora Centre, under the direction of Mary L. Northway and D. A. Millichamp, and deposited from 1976 to 1980.

Associated with this manuscript collection is a small collection of books on child psychology and education by W.E. Blatz and members of his staff, presented by the Blatz Memorial Fund in 1975. The book collection is shelved separately and has its own card file of xeroxed accession cards in the public catalogue.

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INSTITUTE OF CHILD STUDY: A HISTORY

In 1924 Dr. Clare M. Hinks (1885-1964), founder of the Canadian Committee for Mental Hygiene, persuaded the Rockefeller family to found a child study centre in Toronto and fund it for a limited number of years from the Laura Spelman Rockefeller Memorial. Professor E.A. Bott (b. 1887), head of the University of Toronto's Psychology Department, 1923-1957, was also instrumental in the founding and planning of the school. In 1925 W.E. Blatz (1895-1964) was appointed Assistant Professor in the Department of Psychology and Director of the new School.

In January of 1926 the St. George's School for Child Study opened at 47 St. George St. with an initial enrolment of eight children, who were supervised by Blatz himself and Miss D. Dingle. The School was sponsored by the Psychology Department, although it was intended to and did serve as a centre for research done by a variety of departments and disciplines. It contained two divisions: the Nursery School headed by Margaret Fletcher from 1930 on; and the Parent Education division, headed by Mrs. Bott. Early staff also included Miss M. Millman, Mrs. Carroll Langstaff Davis, and, by 1930, Dorothy Millichamp. In 1931 the School moved to larger quarters at 96-98 St. George St.

During the 1930's a large number of research papers and books were published. The "Blatz era" was under way and would last until Blatz's death in 1964, with important works by or influenced by him, appearing later. In 1933 the Institute of Child Study's monograph series was started, its eighteenth and final number appearing in 1940. In 1938 the Institute began publishing its own Bulletin.

The core of the research carried on at the Institute was "longitudinal" research, tracing the development of the child from infancy to adulthood. The records on which the research was based have been preserved but are restricted in use as indicated above. Many of the books and articles based on this data, have been donated to the Library to form the W.E. Blatz Memorial Collection. No new subjects were enrolled in the first longitudinal program after 1949.

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BLATZ (W.E.) COLLECTION

INSTITUTE OF CHILD STUDY: A HISTORY (Cont.)

From 1935-1938 Dr. Blatz, D.A. Millichamp, and other Institute staff compiled research data on the Dionne quintuplets, Dr. Blatz serving as the Educational Consultant to Dr. Dafoe.

In 1939 the University recognized the School was an independent entity where interdisciplinary research was carried out, and renamed it the Institute of Child Study, giving it independent administrative status. No longer considered as an adjunct of the Psychology Department, the Institute now consisted of four divisions: Research; Parent Education (headed by Karl Bernhardt who succeeded Mrs. Bott in 1938), Student Training; and the Nursery School. In 1939 the Institute began to offer a credit course for primary specialists at the Toronto Teachers' College.

During the war years there was an increasing demand for day nurseries in England to care for children whose parents were both involved in the war effort. In 1942 a Canadian Children's Services branch was established to send Blatz and a staff of five, two of whom were Institute staff, to England to set up the Garrison Lane Nursery Centre in Birmingham to serve as a model in the training of British child care workers. In Canada a University of Toronto Committee* was set up to process children evacuated to Canada from war-time Britain.

The Institute also began to train child care workers for war-time day nurseries in Canada. D.A. Millichamp was seconded to the Ontario Welfare Department for the duration of the war to serve as organizing-secretary of the Dominion-Provincial Wartime Day Nurseries. In 1943 the Diploma Course in Child Study was approved by the University of Toronto Senate. The course required a four year B.A. followed by a year's work and study at the Institute. The first class graduated in June 1944.

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INSTITUTE OF CHILD STUDY: A HISTORY (Cont'd)

During the late forties and into the fifties research at the Institute continued with particular emphasis on sociometric research and on Blatz's "security theory". In 1951 the staff of the Institute compiled a book, published by the University of Toronto Press under the title Twenty-five years of child study, 1926-1951, to celebrate the twenty fifth anniversary of the founding of the School.

In September 1953 the Institute moved to new quarters at 45 Walmer Rd. and the staff and students of the private school Windy Ridge, directed by Dr. Blatz since 1930, were amalgamated with the St. George's School. The program at the Institute was expanded in succeeding years to include children up to Grade 6. Two autonomous divisions were established: the Nursery School and the Elementary School. At this time the Institute assimilated a course in children's mental health which had been set up by the Canadian Committee on Mental Hygiene in 1948 for the benefit of teachers. Under the Institute this course became a university credit course. In 1956 a new wing was added to the Walmer Rd. house to handle the expanding facilities. From 1953 to 1958 the Institute was largely funded by the National Department of Health and Welfare. In 1958 the University took over the budget.

In August of 1960 Blatz retired as Director of the Institute, although continuing as professor in the Psychology Department until 1963 and as Director Emeritus until his death in 1964. Karl S. Bernhardt (1901-1967) served as Director until his early retirement in 1964. During the early sixties the second longitudinal study was launched under the title of Longitudinal (Wave) Study - 1962-1974. From 1964 on M.F. Grapko served as Acting Director of the Institute. In 1971, after years of uncertainty and debate about the administrative place of the Institute it was placed under the jurisdiction of the Faculty of Education.

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INSTITUTE OF CHILD STUDY: A HISTORY (Cont.)

In 1968 Mary Northway and Dorothy Millichamp, former Institute staff who had worked closely with Blatz, set up the Brora Centre where they continued with the research they had begun at the Institute under Blatz. The Brora Centre also set up and administered a W.E. Blatz Memorial Fund, which sponsored lectures and research in child study, and preserved and organized the research records and historical documentation of the early Institute of Child Study. The Brora Centre closed in 1980, having deposited its records with the Fisher Rare Book Library.
