THOMAS FISHER RARE BOOK LIBRARY 2023 SUMMER SEMINAR



Bibliographical Studies in Latin America

This seminar will explore the field of bibliographical studies in Latin America from the sixteenth century to the present. During this three-day seminar, participants will learn how to interpret bibliographical evidence to determine the make-up and production of books from the region and how to present their findings in a systematic way using appropriate bibliographical terminology, both in English and Spanish. The seminar will offer a mixture of introductory lectures followed by hands-on practice sessions working with the diverse holdings on Latin America in the Thomas Fisher Rare Book Library, including early printed books on Indigenous languages, printed material produced during the colonial era, and examples of print cultures from the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.

The seminar will take place between June 14–16, 2023 and will be led by bibliographer and scholar, Dr. Guadalupe Rodríguez Domínguez (Universidad Autónoma de San Luis Potosí), and Department Head, David Fernández

(University of Toronto). The Fisher Library seminar aims to provide more opportunities for continuing education in Canada. We welcome all applicants with preference given to librarians, archivists, curators, scholars, antiquarian booksellers, and graduate students whose work and/or research will benefit from attending the seminar. Registration costs will be covered for accepted applicants, and include the registration fee, course materials, and lunch during the three days. Successful applicants are expected to cover their own transportation and accommodation costs.

Applicants are asked to submit an application form and a Curriculum Vitae of no more than three pages by Friday, 31 March 2023.
