## BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE:

Margaret Robinson came of a distinguished Scottish family, being the daughter of General Sir Archibald Alison. In 1884 she married Major-General Charles Walker Robinson, son of Sir John Beverley Robinson, Chief Justice of Canada from 1829 to 1862.

Her interest in Canada, already kindled by her husband's Canadian origins, was deepened by a visit to Canada in 1911, when she says she "got to learn a good deal about outlying district life". She had already helped to form the Colonial Nursing Association with head-quarters in London, England, and had written a short history of the organization in 1909. After visiting Canada she began to correspond with women living in primitive conditions in remote areas of the Canadian West. Many of them were wives and mothers who were bearing children under difficult conditions, and who suffered from many problems, including loneliness.

She wrote letters to them, and arranged for shipments of reading material to be sent. She also succeeded in getting a sub-committee of her original nursing association set up, to form the Canadian Prairie Nursing Association.
