#### **Biography**

The Mykhailo Sytnyk papers focus on the life and activities of the Ukrainian poet. Mykhailo Vasylovych Sytnyk (pseudonym: Mykhailo Chmuryj) was born on June 6, 1919 in the village of Vasylkiv in the Kyiv gubernia. He completed his studies at the Gorky Pedagogical Institute in Kyiv. In 1937 he began publishing in Kyiv and Kharkiv journals, including, among other publications, Molodyi Bilshovyk and Literaturnyi zhurnal. During the German occupation of Ukraine, he served an editor of Litavry (1942), and also published two poetry collections, Vid sertsia (From the Heart, 1942) and Novi obrii (New Horizons, 1942). As a postwar refugee in Germany, Sytnyk published the well-received collections Vidlitaiut' ptytsi (The Birds Fly Away, 1946), and Zaliznychyi storozh (The Railway Guard, 1947), a narrative poem about wartime Ukraine. Sytnyk immigrated to the United States in the early 1950s, where he settled first in Detroit, working for the newspaper *Prometei*, and then in Chicago. He continued to write and published in émigré journals, including over 160 poems and a few feuilletons. A posthumous edition of his poems *Tsvit paporoti* (Flower of the Fern) appeared in 1975, with a bibliography of his works compiled by John Luczkiw. Sytnyk died unexpectedly in Chicago on August 21, 1959.

#### **Scope and content**

The collection consists of correspondence between Sytnyk and his mother in Ukraine, whom he found in the last years of his life; other relatives in Ukraine; and his

wife Hanna Cherin. The letters from Volodymyr Vynnychenko, a writer and political leader, forms the large part of the correspondence. The collection also includes some of Sytnyk's personal documents.

The collection also includes many photographs of Sytnyk. They were taken when he was living in L'viv, Kyiv, Germany, and the United States. He was photographed with famous Ukrainian literary figures, such as, for example, Iurii Kosach and Iurii Klen (pseud. of Oswald Burghardt).

The collection also contains Sytnyk's publications. These include two of his manuscripts, and a number of clippings of his poetry published in different periodicals. The collection also includes many articles about Sytnyk.

In addition, the collection consists of material collected by John Luczkiw for a collection of Sytnyk's poetry entitled *Tsvit paporoti* (Flower of the Fern). Luczkiw compiled the bibliography of Sytnyk's works that was incorporated into the publication.

The collection is organized into six series: biographical records, correspondence, publications, photographs, bibliographical materials, and miscellaneous.

### **Description of series**

#### I. Biographical records: A. Identification documents; B. Recommendations.

The series consists of three of Sytnyk's personal documents (under the name Chmuryj): the Certificate of Identity issued by the Ukrainian Emigration Committee in 1945; the Workbook (ID) for the Foreigner [Arbeitsbuch für Ausländer] issued in 1943 in Germany; the Identity Card in French issued in 1945 in Constance. Also the series consists of documents asking for a permit to the Sytnyk and his wife to be transferred from one refugee camp to another.

The series contains correspondence between Sytnyk and many others, dated from the 1940s till his death. The series consists of letters from Volodymyr Vynnychenko to Sytnyk, written from 1948 to 1951, as well as one to Vynnychenko from Sytnyk. The series includes many letters between Sytnyk, his mother, and other relatives. Also, the series contains correspondence with his wife, Hanna Cherin. A large part of the series consists of letters written to Sytnyk by different people, such as the writers Iurii Kosach and Ostap Hrytsai, the journalist Ievhen Onatskyi, and the composer Hryhorii Kytastyi, from 1940 to 1950.

The series contains Sytnyk's poetry published in a variety of publications. It contains two of Sytnyk's manuscripts: "Liudoidka" and "Mesnyk". The series also includes many articles about Sytnyk.

The series consists of photographs of Sytnyk in the different periods of his life. There are some portraits of him, as well as photographs from Ukraine, Germany, and the United States. In addition, the series contains many photographs of members of Ukrainian communities.

The series includes correspondence to and from John Luczkiw, as well as notes, related to Luczkiw's work on the bibliography of Sytnyk's works, published in an edition of his poems *Tsvit paporoti* (Flower of the Fern).

## VI. Miscellaneous. A. A manuscript; B. Postcards; C. Colour title design; D. Notes and addresses.

The series consists of an identified manuscript and several postcards. Also, the series includes a colour title design for one of the Sytnyk's book, *Tsvit paporoti*. It also has some notes with different addresses, including Haryna Cherin' (then Pankiv.) The series includes a financial invoice.
